Sustainable Water Governance and Indigenous Law

Research Project (2016-2023)

Indigenous peoples have the right to maintain and strengthen their distinctive spiritual relationship with their traditionally owned or otherwise occupied and used lands, territories, waters and coastal seas and other resources and to uphold their responsibilities to future generations in this regard.

Article 25 of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples

This research project seeks to advance scholarship on Indigenous law and sustainable water co-governance. Indigenous voices and perspectives are at the core of our team, which includes Indigenous knowledge keepers and community members, water scientists, social scientists, and artists.

Northern Canada has the third largest oil and gas reserves in the world. Resource exploitation has intensified in this region, and sustainable water governance has become a highly critical issue, particularly for Indigenous communities grappling with access to safe drinking water, environmental water quality, and related livelihood and health issues. Many actors have recently called for the development of new models of Indigenous co-governance and stewardship for water resources that include Indigenous voices, sciences and ontologies at the core of sustainable water resource planning, policy development, and regulatory decision-making.



Working with Indigenous communities in Northern and Western Canada, we will create tools to support Indigenous water co-governance. Leading Canadian legal scholars will devise concrete strategies for governance reforms to support the uptake of these tools.

Our Community-Based Research approach prioritizes Indigenous law as our guiding framework for relationship building, supported by OCAP (*Ownership, Control, Access,*

Possession) protocols, as well as the Community-Based Research protocol developed by the University of British Columbia's First Nations House of Learning. A central component of the project will be annual Water Bush Camps, which offer land-based experiential learning spaces in which training and collaborative research will occur.

Our research is supported by Partnership Grant funding from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (one of Canada's federal academic funding agencies). This grant supports partnerships between academics and partners from private, community and not-for profit sectors. Funded studentships are available at all partner institutions.
